The message rec'd by Mrs Barbour from you, informed me of what I was before ignorant: namely that ~~you~~ ^{the} was entitled to half the interest upon your debt. Nor did I before know that the debtor of an estate held the right to determine to whom any portion of that debt, whether principal or interest was payable. In a temper of harmony & justice we were willing to have suppressed enquiry as to the rights of the parties & then settled those matters at home. My father has no regard to your debt & will never have right to it. An order was made more than 12 months ago to put it into the hands of a Receiver for sale. that I arrested, I dare say that I merit the reward I have recd.

We mean however to take early steps to recover the principal & whatever interest may ~~have~~ ^{be due}. That it may be placed where no difficulties will necessarily be interposed, in obtaining the interest as it may become due.
